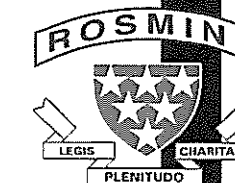

School Information



General Behaviour

Boys must always be aware that they will be judged by the behaviour they exhibit both in school and out. Their actions will reflect on themselves, the college, their parents and their Catholic faith. Courtesy and respect towards others is expected at all times.

Uniform

All pupils are required to wear correct uniform at school, while travelling to and from school and when attending school functions. This can include a school cap which should be worn in the correct manner. Any boy not in correct uniform is expected to have a note of explanation which should be given to the Form Teacher or Dean who will then issue a permission slip.

Stockists

Jan Bells School Uniforms in Mairangi Bay and Yarntons in Birkenhead and Devonport. These stockists also hold stock of regulation socks, shoes and sandals.

To ensure there are no variations in uniform please purchase from these authorised stockists.

Years 7-11: Navy blue shorts, royal blue polo with school emblem and navy jersey with school emblem.

Footwear: Regulation black sandals, or standard plain black (not suede, fabric or plastic) lace-up shoes with navy socks. Socks must be kept up at all times. Please note that training shoes are not acceptable.

Year 12: Navy blue shorts, pale blue shirt with school emblem, navy jersey with school emblem, navy shorts and navy socks. Regulation long mid-grey trousers may be worn. To ensure uniformity, we ask that you purchase these trousers from recognised Rosmini uniform stockists. Cords, jeans, drill, very light or dark grey not acceptable.

Year 13: Navy blue shorts, pale blue shirt with school emblem. Either navy walk socks and plain black shoes or black sandals. Mid-grey long trousers for winter. Navy college jersey with emblem. Dress uniform to be worn on Mondays, Fridays and special occasions – Rosmini blazer, tie, white shirt, long grey trousers, plain black lace-up shoes.

Low cut t-shirts or vests may be worn under shirts in cold weather but should not be visible at the neckline.

PE: Rosmini house PE t-shirt and blue shorts

Only college scarves are allowed, not to be worn inside. Raincoats are not to be worn inside or at assembly, and the official jacket is the only one permitted.

Second-hand uniforms are available – please enquire at the school office

Note: All clothing should be clearly named.

Hair: Only conventional haircuts, the style should not be extreme including, but not limited to, Mohawk, Afro, shaved styles and/or patterns and braided. The colour must be the student's own natural colour. All students must be clean shaven.

Mufti: Occasionally the school holds a mufti day to raise money for a charity. On payment of a small fee, non-uniform clothes are permitted, but they must be tidy and in good taste. Neither bare feet nor jewellery are permitted with mufti. Normal sports uniform should be brought for Physical Education on mufti days.

Jewellery: Wristwatches, Medic-Alert bracelets, religious emblems in keeping with the Catholic Character or badges approved by the Headmaster may be worn. St Christophers and crosses, when worn, should be on discreet chains. Earrings, including studs/sleepers or any other items of jewellery are forbidden.

Absences

Parents are asked to notify the office as soon as possible if their boys are to be absent (ph: 489-5417 after 8.15 am, or email absentees@rosmini.school.nz). A note must be given to the Form Teacher as soon as the pupil returns to school. This should include: date of absence, reason for absence and pupil's name and form. It is the responsibility of the pupil to find the Form Teacher and give him/her the note.

If a pupil needs to leave school during the day he must bring a note from his parent/guardian and give this to his Form Teacher or Dean. The Form Teacher or Dean will then give the student written permission to leave school and he must sign out at the school office. Upon returning to school, or if late for school, all students must sign in at the school office. No student should go directly to class.

Property

School: Boys must take reasonable care of all school property, including text and library books. Any damage to school property should be reported immediately to the School Office, Mr Rogers (Property Manager) or a Dean of Year. Restitution will be required from those responsible for wilful damage.

Personal: All articles of personal property must be clearly marked with the owner's name. Any pupil finding lost property is to take it to School Office and from there it will be taken to FC2 (Mr Hallissey's room) The school will accept no responsibility for the safety of cameras, phones, iPods, laptops, valuable watches, or other costly equipment, or for any un-named personal property.

The following must not be brought onto the school grounds: lighters, matches, cigarettes or tobacco, fireworks or any explosive material, knives or other weapons, alcohol, narcotics or any drug unless it is a medication prescribed by a registered medical practitioner and necessary for the pupil bringing it in. Computers, mobile phones and tablets may only be brought to school once the student and parent have signed the 'Acceptable Computer Use Policy'.

Social Functions

School rules will apply at any school-sponsored social function attended by pupils.

Detentions

Held weekly on Wednesdays after school. Written notification of a school detention is given to all pupils involved. Parents are asked to sign this and return it to the Form Teacher or Dean concerned.

Bicycles

To be kept only in the racks provided. Once on the school grounds boys must dismount and walk their cycles to and from the racks. No boy may borrow another's bicycle without permission. Doubling is not permitted.

All bikes left in the bike compound should be locked. This is the pupil's responsibility.

Cars/motorcycles

Any boy wishing to bring either of these to school must bring a written request from his parent or guardian to Mr Hughes indicating parental approval and asking the school's permission. Students must adhere to drivers licence regulations regarding passengers in cars.

Buses

The teacher on duty will direct boys on to the buses. School rules apply on the buses and bus prefects are to enforce them.

Grounds

At the beginning of each year fields will be allocated to the various form levels as their playing areas. No form of ragging or fighting is permitted. School uniform may not be worn in any game which endangers clothing.

Inside School

Years 7-13 are not permitted to be inside before school, at break or at lunchtime except during a wet lunch or with permission from a specific teacher.

No student should be in the area in front of the school before 9am, morning break or lunchtime. This area is used solely for commuting to and from class or the back play area.

No pupil is permitted to eat or drink during class time. In the event of an official wet break or lunch, food and drink should only be consumed outside or in the Form Class and not in the corridors. Chewing or any form of gum is forbidden.

Pupils should line up along the wall if their classroom is locked or occupied. The corridor and doorway must be kept clear.

Pupils are to stand up when any adult enters the classroom.

There is a one-way system operating in the corridors between classes. The front stairs and the stairs at the far end of the block are "down" only. The stairs opposite the pupils' entrance are "up" only.

No pupils are permitted to use the front door. No pupil should go through or be in the school foyer unless they are seeing the Headmaster or Deputy Headmaster.

Bounds

The boundaries of the school are defined by:

- the fenceline along the top field;
- the fenceline separating the school from the houses in Dominion Street;
- the fenceline separating the school from St Joseph's property;
- the touchline of the bottom field.

Beyond these lines is considered to be out-of-bounds and no pupil is allowed there without permission.

Homework

In Years 7-10 this is set at the discretion of the teacher but a general guide would be up to an hour for Year 7, rising to 2 hours at Year 10. In the senior school 30 minutes per subject, ie up to 3 hours per night. This does not include revision or general study time.

BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) is compulsory for Year 9 students. Device usage is governed by the "Rosmini College Acceptable Use Policy" and needs to be agreed to by each student using electronic devices on the school grounds. During very wet weather the lunch times may vary.

Financial

The fees and parental contributions for 2017 are:

Years 7 & 8	\$1,572 or \$1,172 where there is an older brother in the school (The compulsory Attendance Dues content of these amounts is \$420)
Years 9-13	\$1,976 or \$1,576 where there is an older brother in the school (The compulsory Attendance Dues content of these amounts is \$824)

There are four elements to the school fees – the compulsory Attendance Dues, the School Contribution, the Building Fund and the Special Character Contribution. School Contributions are retained within the school. The compulsory Attendance Dues, the Building Fund and Special Character contributions are collected on behalf of the Proprietor, the Roman Catholic Bishop of Auckland. The school remits these amounts, normally on a weekly basis, to the appropriate Proprietor's account.

It is important for parents to be aware that the Diocese is insistent on the payment of the Catholic Dues and that, ultimately, it employs a debt-collecting agency to pursue any unpaid amounts. You may recall you had to recognise your commitment in this area when completing the enrolment form.

The School Contribution is kept by the school to help with school running costs whilst the Building Fund is transferred to a separate trust fund in the name of the RC Bishop of Auckland. Parents may not be aware that the Ministry of Education does not fund new buildings/facilities in Catholic schools. Any money retained in the school is considered as crown funds and, as such, is not available for building development. Thus, the Building Fund transferral out of school funds to the Bishop allows for necessary developments of which there have been quite a few over recent years, the most obvious being the Science Block, the Technology Block and the new Gymnasium.

The school notifies parents at the beginning of each term of amounts set and parents choose to pay either the full year, or term by term, or set up automatic payments for, say, weekly amounts. Internet transfers are also now a commonly-used method of payment. Should you wish to use the automatic payment method, you approach your own Bank for the arrangement, crediting to Rosmini College Board of Trustees, BNZ Takapuna, 020272-0330978-00. Be sure to include your son's name and school ID number in the reference section or we do not know who has made the payment. You may also wish to pay in advance of the school year - there is no problem with this.

The Building Fund, School Contribution and Special Character are considered as donations by the IRD and can therefore generate a tax rebate.

International Students

Fees for international students for 2017 are \$16,750.00 (\$14,750.00 School Fee and \$2,000.00 Administration Fee to be paid at the beginning of the year.
